





Percentage of Canadian population comprised of persons aged 65 or older, 1921 to 2005 and projections to 2056



Dehydration and Hospitalization

- Elderly dehydration is one of the most common causes of hospitalization among people over 65. In fact ½ of those hospitalized for dehydration die within one year.
